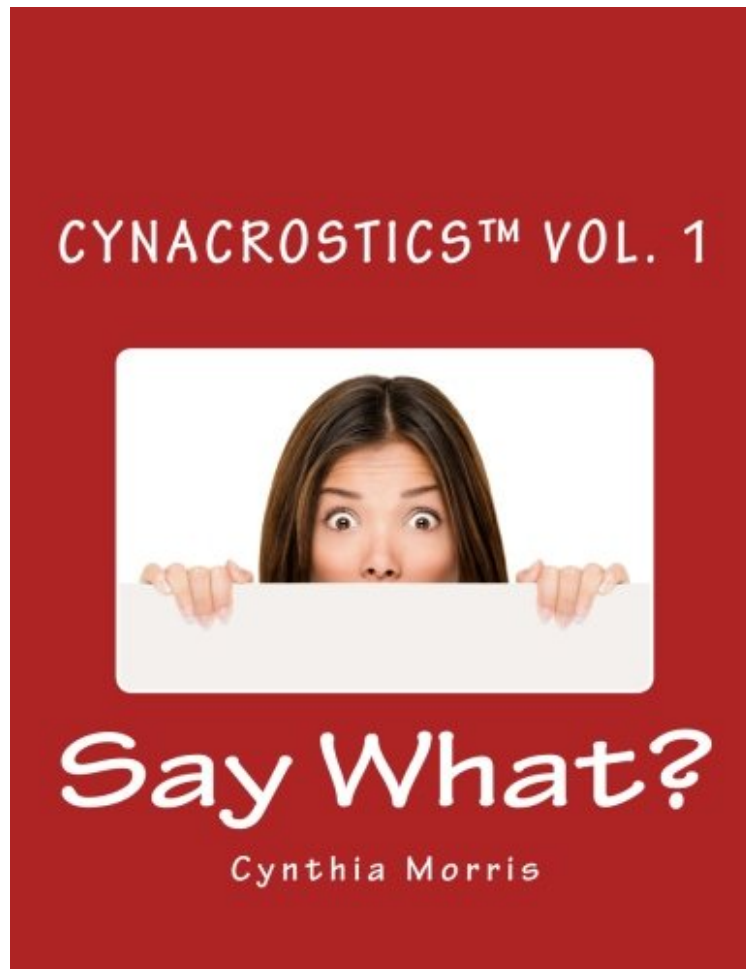

Alas, they seem to be getting harder and harder to find. The New York Times prints excellent ones by Cox and Rathvon, but only every two weeks, and they seem to have discontinued printing books of them, several years ago. The Ecrostics site still has lots, and some of us have resorted to printing out puzzles from the old Saturday Review (which is where they originated): you can find them on Ron Unz's periodical site. So it was a pleasant surprise to find that Cynthia Morris has published a bunch of collections of her "Cynacrostics". This book, along with Volume 2 CynAcrostics Volume 2: Reel-y? contain new puzzles, and there are two more with puzzles that originally appeared on her web site (of course, if you didn't do them then, they will be new!). Cyn's acrostics are excellent. Not quite as hard as the New York Times ones, but still challenging. And

the clues are often cleverly phrased, with puns and other surprises. And (best of all!) after solving quite a few, I didn't encounter a single mistake (miscluing or misnumbering or typo). As a constructor myself, I know how easy it is for errors to creep in, but she and her test solvers have done a terrific job. Highly recommended. 2 of 2 people found the following review helpful.
