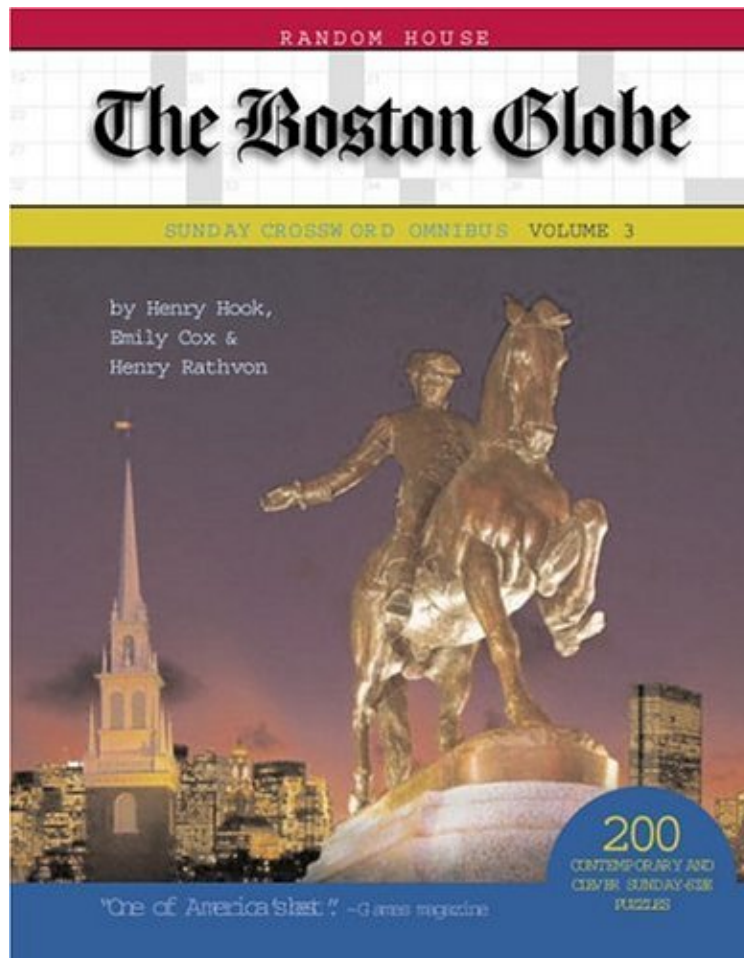

This calls for much better editing but since the edition came out in 2003, the editors probably don't much care about that anymore. Update: After doing 20 pages of the Volume, the only repeats apparently were in the first 5 pages as stated above, so upping my review from the original two stars to three stars now.
